Women contact the Centre for many reasons. They may be looking for resources and not sure where to find them. They may have been referred by a health care professional, community service or friend to get specific supports like counselling. They may have Googled or found us in a directory or seen our social media.

The Assessment referral service provides them with a listening ear, careful referrals to resources at the Centre or in the community, and if requested, a brief initial intake interview for the counselling service. With the support of our VOIP phone system, we have been able to answer the phone during office hours right away. Many women will also choose to email us to make initial contact. We look forward to welcoming more in-person visitors seeking information later in 2023-24.

Thank you to the social work placement students and staff who respond to women in a timely, effective, and compassionate manner. Your care makes it easier for women to reach out and get the support they need.

In 2022-23, we moved to a hybrid model of educational offerings, including a mix of online webinars and in-person workshops. Webinars were offered on-line, and starting in Winter 2023, we also offered in-person workshops at a larger location – the Toronto Public Library at Scarborough Civic Centre.

This past year was a roller-coaster of changing mandates, and new variants. The Centre continued to diligently ensure that opportunities for learning and connection remained constant throughout. Participants expressed appreciation for the opportunity to continue to learn together with other women, to feel less isolated, and to learn valuable information on a variety of topics.

Those who attended in-person meetings were also grateful for the opportunity to engage with other participants before and after class. At the same time, it has been helpful for some women to participate on-line who wouldn't have been able to attend inperson (due to issues related to mobility, work schedule, childcare, eldercare, etc). We will continue to offer a mix of in-person workshops and on-line webinars, expanding the number of in-person workshops and exploring additional locations.


It has sometimes been more difficult to gather information about outcomes achieved in the webinars, and we look forward to having more information in the coming year as more in-person workshops are offered.



Counselling Program

Throughout the evolving pandemic, our professional counselling supports have been offered by phone and web conference. We have continued to provide free counselling to women consistently to ensure that they have the supports they need. This program was supported by 3 professional counsellors, working with a trauma-informed, solution focused, and asset-driven approach.

Some women in transition were matched with trained community volunteers who will provide mentoring support for a 6 month to one year period. This year, we had 21 matches in place (2 for English conversation, 13 for Economic independence, 5 for Emotional Support and 5 for Economic independence/emotional support), and trained 10 new direct service volunteers to provide mentoring support. Mentees reported outcomes related to: Navigating systems, Developing life skills to move forward, Addressing physical/emotional health issues, Building support networks, and Connecting with community resources

Through our Expanding the Reach (ETR): Outreach to Women with Disabilities program, we:

- Facilitated webinars that improved the employment marketability and readiness of women with disabilities
- Introduced participants to the Sustainable Livelihoods Canada model which supports women to build on their assets, while focusing on areas they would like to strengthen
- Partnered with Centennial College to host an event, "Shattering Barriers", which promoted inclusion of people with disabilities in the workforce
- Developed resources for use by individuals supporting women experiencing gender-based violence in partnership with Connecting Women with Scarborough Services (CWSS)
- Facilitated interactive training sessions for service providers interested in learning more about how to respond and cope with to disclosures of gender-based violence in partnership with CWSS
- Organized educational training opportunities and individual supports to build staff resilience at SWC





MOVING FORWARD PROJECT

Building on work done through a special grant from the province last year, we continued to build our capacity to support women in transition to training and employment. Particularly in the context of the COVID-19 pandemic, many women had experienced job loss, lay-offs, and their sectors (e.g. retail, restaurants, etc) were severely affected. Economic security is a huge factor in being able to prevent gender based violence.

Some highlights of this year were:

- Launched an on-line micro-credential course with the support of Centennial College's School of Part Time Studies. The first cohort of 24 participants involved a 3 month, 9 module course that was self-directed by participants. They were also given an official College student number, access to the College library, and the Success advisors at the College. Our Canistra Mariyathas recruited, screened and supported participants and maintained liaison with the College. 19 women completed all modules are received a certificate of completion from the College. A second cohort will participate in Fall 2023.
- Continued to update the handbook of employment and training resources (available on our website)
- Addition of more training and employment related educational opportunities in our programs


